

Overview of Community Pulse


Fielded every spring and fall.

Respondent by Zip Code and Planning District Commission (n=119)






Top Current Issues in Virginia: Employment, Affordable Housing and Uncertainty of Government Funding



Behind the Numbers: Voices from Virginia

"Uncertainty at state government level still generating concerns for the continuance of local government services/mandates. In many cases this has a direct impact on the continued operation and provision for local non-profits that assist with programs to provide housing assistance and need-based services, as well as the median wealth of the community as a whole."

"Access to small business financing – Homebased businesses and niche agribusinesses appear to be growing in popularity as a result of the impact of the economic downturn on larger businesses and corporations. These local businesses form the base of the County's economy and finding new, innovative ways of helping them grow and prosper will be a key economic development strategy in the near future." "The City...is experiencing a significant truncation in the number of affordable units due to the increasing level of gentrification and the decreasing level of affordable financing to stabilize the current market and build new units of housing."

"[The City] has been significantly impacted by the closure of several manufacturing plants. It is barely hanging on to coal industry jobs. The replacement in the economy is tourism based. While we are grateful for the improving economy, it does not replace the jobs dollar for dollar. Our community remains at risk."

"The growth and development of the local economy is tied to the success of the local education system. If the system provides a quality of education that prepares its students to be college and workforce ready, that attracts business investment that grows the job market."


