Revolving Loan Fund: Helping Small Businesses Grow

The Regional Commission manages a Revolving Loan Fund designed to support small businesses across our region. Whether you are just getting started or ready to expand, the NRV RLF can help cover equipment, facility improvements, or working capital.

Loan amounts typically range from \$10,000 to \$25,000, with flexible repayment terms and low interest rates. This option is helpful for businesses that may not qualify for traditional financing or are piecing together different sources of funding to move forward.



Businesses interested in applying will first start with a quick pre-application, and if the proposed project meets basic eligibility and program guidelines, will be invited to submit a formal application for review. All loan decisions are made by a volunteer committee made up of public and private sector representatives who are committed to supporting small business development in the New River Valley.

The fund has supported a wide range of businesses, including retail shops updating their space, local food and beverage businesses opening new locations, service providers upgrading tools, and home-based makers growing into storefronts. The goal is to meet businesses where they are and provide flexible financing to help them grow.

GO Virginia Funds Site Advancement Strategy for the New River Valley

GO Virginia Region 2 has approved funding for a new Site Advancement Strategy in Virginia's New River Valley. The project will invest \$94,400 in state funds and \$108,479 in regional contributions to strengthen the readiness of industrial sites across Floyd, Giles, Montgomery, and Pulaski counties, as well as the City of Radford.

Community Health Team Site Visit: Harrisonburg Navigation Center

On Friday, August 15, the Community Health Team led a group of 17 regional partners, including county administration, law enforcement, housing professionals, and service providers, on a site visit to the *Navigation Center* in Harrisonburg, VA.

The strategy, managed by the New River Valley Regional Commission in collaboration with Onward New River Valley, will build on the region's 2019 Virginia Business Ready Sites Program (VBRSP) assessment. Since that time, infrastructure upgrades, landownership changes, and evolving market conditions have made an updated evaluation necessary. Each locality will select one priority site for review, and a regional site will also be included to create a portfolio of sites at varying levels of readiness.

By addressing infrastructure gaps, evaluating environmental constraints, and providing a clear path through the VBRSP readiness tiers, the project will help the region overcome a shortage of shovel-ready sites. Preparing properties for future investment will expand the New River Valley's ability to attract employers in high-wage industries. By preparing sites for future investment, the New River Valley can expand its ability to attract employers and create long-term job growth.

Earlier this year, Open Doors, their housing support nonprofit, launched the Navigation Center, a year-round, 80-bed overnight shelter for adults experiencing homelessness. Beyond shelter, the Navigation Center serves as a community hub for resources. During the day, it is open to anyone seeking access to wrap-around services, programs, and supports designed to promote housing stability, health, employment, selfsufficiency, and personal growth. As part of the visit, the group met with Harrisonburg Mayor Deanna Reed and several stakeholders to learn more about their funding model, partner collaboration. community engagement strategies, successes, challenges, and lessons learned.

The Community Health Team hosted a larger scale follow-up Zoom debrief on Friday, August 22, with all interested partners and stakeholders, to reflect on takeaways from the trip.

Expanding Access, Empowering Communities: Broadband Success in Montgomery County

The Regional Commission is excited to celebrate a major milestone in regional connectivity! Montgomery County, in conjunction with New River Valley Regional Commission (NRVRC) and GigaBeam, has successfully completed a broadband expansion project funded by a 2021 Virginia Telecommunication Initiative (VATI) grant from the Virginia Department of Housing and Community Development (DHCD). Focused on the Alleghany Springs, Elliston, Lafayette, and Shawsville communities, this initiative has delivered high-speed,

reliable internet to 1,320 serviceable units—including 44 businesses and community anchors—exceeding its original service goals.

The project added 7.4 miles of strategically designed fiber optic infrastructure, deployed by internet service provider GigaBeam. With construction now complete, residents and businesses in these previously unserved and underserved areas can finally access the internet speeds necessary for remote work, virtual learning, telehealth, streaming, and ecommerce. This is a transformative leap forward in bridging the digital divide in our rural communities.

Beyond immediate access, the deployment of this robust fiber network lays the groundwork for long-term economic development and digital inclusion. It is a shining example of what strong partnerships, thoughtful planning, and persistent advocacy can achieve.
